STRENGTHS

POLICY COMMITMENT: Policies address tree issues during development, preservation and landscaping.

ADVOCACY: According to the city's tree ordinance, the Tree Board advocates for trees and is responsible for compiling an Annual Community Forestry Work Plan.

DEPARTMENT DEDICATION: The Department of Public Works dedicates resources to tree removal and maintenance throughout the

CHALLENGES

INSUFFICIENT FUNDING: The City lacks the budget to create a robust urban forestry program.

STAFF CAPACITY/PRIORITIES: The Department of Public Works' focus is on tree maintenance, removal, and tree planting. No direct contract was available to support this initial needs assessment.

PUBLIC AND PRIVATE PLANTINGS: A high percentage of available plantable areas is on private property and beyond the reach and scope of public plantings.

OPPORTUNITIES

INCREASE POLICY COMMITMENT: Work on developing a tree ordinance, replacement standards, and disease mitigation plan in order to protect current canopy and prevent devastating loss. Support long-term program stability.

DEVELOP GUIDING DOCUMENTS: An urban forestry master plan, management plan, and resiliency plan, could help build program framework and establish future direction.

REGIONAL PARTNERSHIP: Work with the county and surrounding communities to collaborate on tree plantings and other projects.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT: Celebrating Arbor Day allows Fraser to promote tree benefits and demonstrate commitment to trees. The city plants a tree in a public park and offers free seedlings to residents. Arbor Day has been celebrated every year since 2014.

OUTDATED ORDINANCES: The city's ordinances do not reflect the urban forestry program's current state and are lacking mechanisms to increase canopy on a large scale.

PUBLIC PERCEPTION: Some residents may lack an understanding of the value of community tree canopy.

FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES: Search for funding sources to support the county and local goals to increase tree canopy.

PUBLIC-PRIVATE PARTNERSHIP: Residential areas provide opportunities for planting on private property and city-owned rights-of-way. Encourage residents to value and plant trees on their property through establishment of a purchasing and education program.

STRENGTHEN ORDINANCES: Update and strengthen city tree ordinance references to provide enforceable forestry guidelines.

CODE AND ORDINANCE OVERVIEW

This document provides a quick reference for how community forestry is incorporated into the local regulatory framework. It can serve as initial guidance for future updates and potential action. The matrix below gives an overview of the forestry and landscape standards included in local ordinances, based on those elements typically included in robust programs. While this overview determines whether an element is included and the

corresponding location within local legislation, it does not provide an in depth review of the quality of each element nor how well it is actually functioning in practice. A more detailed matrix is kept with the Macomb County Department of Planning and Economic Development and can be made available upon request to support local updates. SPECIFICATIONS & STANDARDS MANUAL

A Specifications and Standards Manual can be created to organize all relevant information used to guide tree management into a single document. It houses information regarding species, sizing, spacing, planting, removal, replacement and maintenance requirements. Ideally, the manual would be referenced in the ordinance, but would be kept separate. Maintaining the document outside the ordinance allows for easy changes and in depth explanations. Like any city plan, the Specifications and Standards Manual should be revisited every few years to make updates.

SPECIES LISTS

It is best to maintain species lists outside the code of ordinances to more easily respond to changing environmental conditions and new diseases, which may effect urban canopy. This revision can be implemented during the next round of ordinance updates.
